Alaska Occupational Safety Summit 2018 Post Conference

PURPOSE

This document describes the topics, learning objectives, and fees associated with participating in all or part of a 3-day progressive fall protection program delivered at the American Society of Safety Professionals' (ASSP) Alaska Chapter Occupational Safety Summit (October 2018).

APPROACH & CONTENT

Day 1: Fall Protection Basics (Anyone in Need of Basic Fall Protection Understanding)

Topic	Learning Objectives
Managed Fall Protection Basics	Identify common fall protection myths and facts. Identify the primary elements necessary in a managed fall protection program as defined in ANSI Z359.2-2017.
Fall Hazard Identification and Control	Recognize fall hazards in walking working surfaces. Describe the hierarchy of controls for fall hazards.
Active Fall Protection Systems	Identify the basic components of an active fall protection system. Describe the need for rescue planning in fall protection.

Day 2: How to Stay Safe While Working at Heights (Authorized Persons)

Topic	Learning Objectives
Active Fall Protection Systems	Properly fit a full-body harness. Describe the use and limitations of connecting means. Describe the necessity to select a safe anchorage point. Describe the necessity to ensure fall clearance is accurately computed for a fall protection system. Interpret system use and rescue procedures

Day 3: How to Oversee those Subjected to Fall Hazards (Competent Persons)

Topic	Learning Objectives
Fall Hazard Identification and Control	Identify walking working surface compliance issues. Select fall hazard control methods using the hierarchy of controls. Demonstrate a method for assessing risk in fall hazards. Prioritize hazards for abatement.
Active Fall Protection Systems	Ensure the proper selection of safe anchorage points. Calculate fall clearance. Create a system use and rescue procedure.

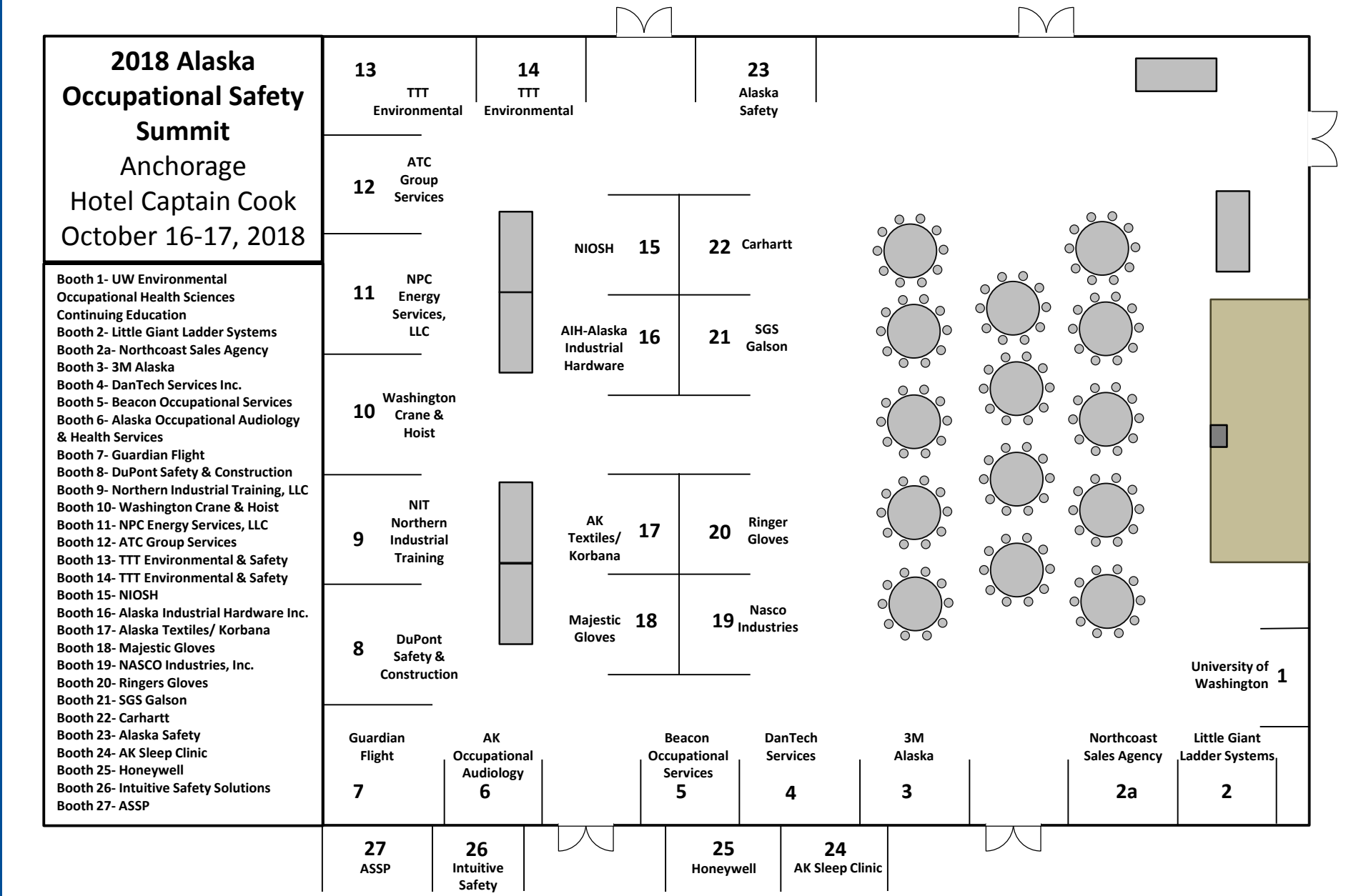
